

Pupil Premium Report 2012/13

Overview

The Pupil Premium is a specific grant based on:

- children registered eligible for Free School Meals (FSM)
- looked after children (LAC)
- children of parents currently serving in the armed forces.

This service premium is designed to address the emotional and social well-being of these pupils. The Pupil Premium is additional to main school funding and it will be used by this school to address any underlying inequalities between children eligible by ensuring that funding reaches the pupils who need it most.

Statistics

In the 2012 to 2013 financial year, schools received:

- £534 for each eligible primary aged pupil

In 2012/13 there were 171 children eligible for Pupil Premium funding. This equated to approximately 27% of the school population.

The profile of our Pupil Premium children are as follows:

Each year group has a similar number of children entitled to Pupil Premium, apart from Year 6, who have a larger proportion of eligible pupils.

In the 2012 to 2013 financial year, Chorlton Park received £91,314.

Vision for Pupil Premium in our school

At Chorlton Park Primary School we are using our funding in three main areas:

1. To achieve academically: to raise attainment and progress
2. To participate in a range of experiences
3. To develop skills for success in life

Chorlton Park guarantees that all pupils:

- Will receive quality ICT provision
- Will receive quality music provision
- Will receive quality sports coaching
- Will attend the Year 4/Year 6 residential visits

Provision

In 2012/13 we are used the Pupil Premium funding to provide:

- Additional Teachers in Years 2, 4 and 6 to provide targeted support for pupil premium children in class
- TA training and interventions
- Mathematics Booster groups in Year 3 taught by our Mathematics lead teacher
- Specialist IT staff
- Small group tuition
- Social & Emotional aspects of learning groups
- Speech and Language Therapist – to deliver programmes and provide training and support
- Attendance monitoring and support, including the funding of a Parent Support Advisor
- Support with funding residential trips
- Support with funding Music tuition and Wider Opportunities music provision

As a result of the additional funding, these children will make better progress and achieve higher standards that would have been likely without it.

Outcomes

The summary below shows the children's progress in each year group for 2011/12 and 2012/13, comparing those children entitled to Pupil Premium with those who are not.
